



# BROADCAST TEAM



**GREG WOLF**

Wolf, a native of Marin County, California, got his first experience with sports broadcasting while in college at UCLA, working on air for the campus radio and television stations. Following graduation, he worked at CBS's Fresno affiliate before he was hired as a writer for the national prime-time show on Fox Sports. Wolf joined TVG in 1999 and hosted The Jockey Club Tour on Fox. Wolf joined the team at NYRA for the launch of Saratoga Live in 2016 and returned in an expanded role at Belmont and Saratoga in 2017.



**PAUL LO DUCA**

A former Major League Baseball All-Star and veteran handicapper, LoDuca joined the NYRA broadcast team in 2017 as a member of Saratoga Live serving as an analyst and handicapper. Lo Duca played 11 seasons in Major League Baseball from 1998-2008, earning four All-Star selections for three different franchises from 2003-06 as a catcher.



**ANDY SERLING**

The always opinionated Serling has been offering his handicapping insights on the NYRA circuit as a member of the broadcast team since 2008. Serling is a cornerstone of NYRA's flagship Live programs, Talking Horses and is the host of the Across the Board podcast, launched in April 2017. Previous to working in the racing industry, Serling traded options on the floor of the American Stock Exchange and played the horses for a living. Fans can also follow Serling on Twitter where he offers insights for horseplayers daily.



**LARRY COLLMUS**

Highly respected for his work during the Triple Crown and the Breeders' Cup for NBC Sports, Larry Collmus succeeded the legendary Tom Durkin as the voice of NYRA in 2015. Collmus's announcing career began at age 18, first calling races at Bowie Race Course in 1985. The Maryland native has since been the regular announcer for Golden Gate Fields, Suffolk Downs, Monmouth Park, Gulfstream Park, and Churchill Downs.



**MAGGIE WOLFENDALE**

Wolfendale has been NYRA's paddock analyst since October 2010. The daughter of Maryland trainer Howard Wolfendale, Maggie served as a television analyst at Pimlico and Colonial Downs prior to joining NYRA. Along with her broadcasting career, Maggie is still involved in the training aspect of the industry, working with her husband trainer Tom Morley, and retraining several retired thoroughbreds into new careers.



**LAFFIT PINCAY III**

Pincay III is a veteran of covering high-stakes races. As a child, Pincay III developed his love and knowledge of racing when visiting tracks to support his father- Hall of Fame jockey Laffit Pincay, Jr. Over the past 16 years, Pincay III has covered Saratoga's Grade I stakes, the Breeders' Cup, and multiple installments of each Triple Crown race.



**TOM AMOSS**

As an active trainer with multiple graded stakes wins, Amoss brings an expert perspective to the analysis team. Amoss, a native of New Orleans and a graduate of Louisiana State University, worked for Hall of Famer Jack van Berg, Frank Brothers, Larry Robideaux and John Parisella before going out on his own in 1987 at the age of 25. Since then he has saddled dozens of stakes winners, including Heritage of Gold, heroine of the 1999 Diana at Saratoga, and Backtalk, who took the 2009 Sanford Stakes at the Spa.



**JONATHON KINCHEN**

Kinchen is a seasoned horse player, the 2015 National Handicapping Challenge champion and the first National Handicapping Championship participant to have both of his entries qualify for The Final Table. Kinchen's 2015 Tour Championship came on the back of four tournament wins and two second-place finishes in 2015.



**GARY STEVENS**

Stevens registered 5,187 wins and purse earnings in excess of \$258 million in a Hall of Fame career that spanned four decades. The 55-year-old won 11 Breeders' Cup races and enjoyed tremendous success in the Triple Crown series, winning each race on three occasions, including Kentucky Derby victories aboard Winning Colors (1988), Thunder Gulch (1995) and Silver Charm (1997). He is one of just nine jockeys with three Belmont Stakes wins having piloted Thunder Gulch (1995), Victory Gallop (1998) and Point Given (2001) to famous scores. A successful actor and television analyst for NBC Sports, HRTV, and TVG, Stevens portrayed Hall of Fame jockey George Woolf in the film "Seabiscuit," and starred in the HBO series "Luck."
